Prior to seminary, as a wealthy FBI Agent, I gave a small percentage of my income to the church. In seminary we gave very little for my wife, Cheryl, was our sole financial support making \$8,000 a year as a teacher in a "Tennessee Holler."

Then God called us to a church in League City, Texas. The Rector that I served under assumed we would tithe 10% of our total salary to the church. From that first paycheck at St. Christopher in League City until this very day we have lived on 90% of our income. The first check I write each month is to the church.

Yes, from the moment we arrived in Texas in 1981 with our kids, who were 8, 10 and 12, we have tithed 10% of our salary to the church. It is a true miracle! Even though our kids tell us today that they were embarrassed at times for not having "designer things" they made it through high school and college with no debt in the Tucker Family.

Cheryl and I are miracles...I suspect you may find a miracle or two in your family history if you really stop and think where you have come from.

HELPING SOLVE THE MYSTERY OF AUNT MOLLY'S GIFTS

I believe Grace Church shares the unique privilege of having the same or similar altar and/or reredos as the home church in Hagerstown, Maryland, of Molly McGill (Rosenberg). Most have seen the beautiful photo of the Hagerstown church furnishings at the back of Grace Church. At first I thought this was a new photo of our Grace Church altar and reredos.

Our altar and reredos were commissioned and donated by Molly McGill Rosenberg of Hagerstown, surviving widow of Henry Rosenberg. The cornerstone for the current Grace Church sanctuary was set in 1894, and the church was dedicated and the doors opened in 1895. Grace was actually started as a mission in 1874 and became a parish in the first wooden church building in 1876.

The artist who created our altar and reredos is a small mystery. A church historian believes the wood carver to be Swedish, working in the Black Forest region of Germany. The panels of the altar and the reredos are called maps, and the wood carvers followed a map design to tell the story present in the altar and reredos.

The history of Saint John's Parish Hagerstown began when a priest from All Saints, Fredericktowne, Maryland, rode over the mountains in 1744 to conduct services of worship and bring the sacraments to those living in what is now Hagerstown.

The parish's first home, built in 1747, was known as "Chapel of the Woods." The construction of a new church on Mulberry Street was begun in 1785, and the original cemetery is still maintained on that site. In 1786, Saint John's divided from its parent parish and elected its first vestry in April of 1787. The building was consecrated ten years later by the first Bishop of Maryland, John Thomas Claggett.


As the congregation continued to grow, the fourth rector of Saint John's Parish challenged the membership to build another church building. Land was purchased, and a handsome building of stone and brick was constructed on the northeast corner of Jonathan Street (now Summit Avenue) and Antietam Street. It was finished in 1832 and consecrated two years later by the second Bishop of Maryland.

A fire in the town's business district destroyed the building in December of 1871. The following year, under the leadership of the thirteenth rector, the cornerstone was laid for the present beautiful American Gothic church building. In 1891, the property adjoining the church became available and was purchased for a new rectory.


The most striking interior appointment of Saint John's is the magnificent carved oak reredos with a central bronze panel. This, along with a communion table, a bishop's chair, credence table, and resurrection window in the sanctuary were gifts, in 1898, of Mrs. Henry Rosenberg, the former Mollie MacGill, as memorials to members of her family. The reredos and communion table produced by Swiss wood carvers in the Black Forest of Germany had been brought to this country for display at the 1893 Columbian Exposition.

The Cathedral in Nashville Tennessee, Christ's Church also has a very same or similar reredos however they do not have the altar that is present here at Grace and at St John's. In June 1829, a congregation in Nashville elected the first Vestry of Christ Church, and a little over a year later laid the cornerstone of the first Episcopal church structure in Tennessee.

By 1837, Christ Church Parish had grown to 72 members. Despite dissension over the issue of rented pews in 1858, when part of the parish left to form the Church of the Advent, membership continued to grow steadily. Christ Church was fortunate to escape occupation by Federal troops during the Civil War, and by 1867 had 145 communicants on its rolls. Construction began in 1889 on the current structure at 9th Ave. and Broadway, a building now listed in the National Register of Historic Places. It opened its doors for services in December 1894 just months before Grace's new sanctuary was opened for our first service. Christ Church has been the Diocesan Cathedral for the last 11 years.





The Pre-search Process

The first step in the process of calling a new rector is a Parish meeting to establish our “Core Values”. We did not have to revisit our mission statement because everyone likes the mission statement we have. That gathering was held on September 17th. The next step will be another Parish Life meeting to look into our “Vision Statement”. This meeting is scheduled for October 22nd at 9:00am. In the meantime there is work being done to update our “Parish Profile” by our brochure committee. After the Parish meetings are completed, you will be given a chance to have a voice in expressing what you want to see in a rector by completing a Parish survey. The results will be collated and the resulting profile will be given to the search committee to guide them. Let’s address the search committee. A committee will be formed by the Vestry to select candidates to serve. The candidates selected will be interviewed to assure the committee that they will represent the desires of the parishioners, as outlined in the Rector profile and do all the work necessary to make a recommendation. You will be given the opportunity to send in names of Rector(s) you would like to recommend. It will be the Bishop’s decision as to whether the person you recommend is on the final list of candidates. As you can see, much work still lies ahead for all of us who love Grace Church.




